

Developer Acquires Victoria Place in Downtown Painesville

Plans for the 191,000 square foot building complex include commercial and retail space.

PAINESVILLE, OHIO, NOVEMBER 14, 2019 - Renew Partners LLC (Renew) a real estate developer in Northeast Ohio, recently purchased and has announced plans to redevelop Victoria Place in Downtown Painesville, Ohio. Victoria Place, originally a retail mall, is currently being used as an office building. Renew, through its affiliate Vic Place LLC, acquired the 191,000 square foot property from Painesville Commercial Properties Inc., an affiliate of the CentiMark Corporation, North America's largest roofing contractor. Plans for the building complex includes commercial & retail space and potentially apartments. The building is currently home to 13 commercial tenants whom will remain.

Renew has already engaged <u>JCI Contractors, Inc.</u> for consulting and pre-construction services. The group is currently in the process to roll out a plan to update the buildings critical infrastructure components such as the HVAC, lighting, etc.

Renew is no stranger to developing large, complex projects of this sort. Renew is led by Chuck Borsukoff and Shawn Neece, who, along with JCI Contractors (JCI) redeveloped the Historic Hotel Ashtabula into medical offices and is currently occupied by Signature Health and own the building through its 4726 Main Avenue LLC affiliate. This 55,000 square foot historic adaptive reuse rehabilitation project is the largest in Ashtabula County's history. The same team also completed

the adaptive reuse of the Historic Mentor Village Hall and the Old Chardon Post Office. Both buildings are now offices for the accounting firm NMS. In late 2018, Renew, through other affiliates, also acquired the Historic Castle Block property, Carlisle-Allen Department Store Complex in downtown Ashtabula and has already begun the design and pre-construction process. With a development budget of nearly \$25 million, the properties will soon be home to apartments and commercial retail. In September of 2019, through it's Vineyard Hotel Group LLC affiliate, Renew co-developed with Emerald Hospitality Associates, Inc. a brand new, \$11.5 million Hampton by Hilton hotel in Madison, Ohio. The 4-story, 82-room hotel is the first hospitality property in Renew's portfolio.

Chuck Borsukoff & Shawn Neece both agree and say, "We are pleased to embark on this new development and be part of the resurgence of downtown Painesville."

"We're excited to roll up our sleeves and get to work on this great building" explains Charlie Borsukoff, President of JCI Contractors, Inc. "We look forward to being on the forefront of the Downtown Painesville redevelopment process. We are especially appreciative of the City of Painesville, including Cathy Bieterman (Economic Development Director), Monica Ireland-Dupee (City Manager), our development partners, and all the other community stakeholders that helped make this a reality."



Keeping Rural Neighbors and Animals Out — Ohio's Line Fence Law


On September 30, 2008, the Ohio legislature passed changes to the existing laws relating to line fences in unincorporated areas which created new rules for fences constructed on the line between two properties in such unincorporated areas. It also established the process for resolving disputes over those fences. The largest change in the law was altering the rule of "equal shares" for line fences. Specifically, with minor exceptions, under the old law, adjacent landowners were required to share equally in the cost of building and maintaining a line fence. That approach has now been replaced with two different rules of responsibility. First, a rule of "individual responsibility" now applies to new fences; and a landowner will be individually and solely responsible for building and maintaining the new fence. Secondly, as to previously existing fences, the rule of "equitable shares" applies which requires the responsibility be apportioned between adjoining landowners after consideration of six fairness factors. This law also changed the process for resolving line fence disputes in that landowners may choose to take a line fence dispute to the Court of Common Pleas in the county where the fence is located or the Board of Township Trustees where it is located. Finally, it contains standards for new line fences that contain livestock and addresses issues such as obstruction of line fence construction and access to adjoining land.

With this noted, here are some of the highlights of this law. First, Ohio's line fence law--also referred to as the "partition fence law"--establishes rights and obligations for fences that are placed on the division line between properties in Ohio's unincorporated areas. Accordingly, it does not apply to all properties—only those in unincorporated areas--and does not apply to the enclosure of lots within municipal corporations, adjoining lots outside of a municipality, property governed by railroad laws, or property governed by a written agreement entered into and recorded by the landowners. Second, this law creates different rules of responsibility for line fences, depending upon the type of fence at issue: (1) an "equitable shares" rule applies to line fences that existed before September 30, 2008, (2) a rule of "individual responsibility" applies to "new" fences built after September 30, 2008 and (3) the old "equal shares" rule applies to certain governmental fences.

Next, an owner who negligently permits his or her livestock to run at large will be liable for all damages resulting from injury, death or loss to person or property caused by the livestock on the premises of another. Fourth, for fences existing prior to September 30, 2008, parties must "equitably" or "fairly" share responsibility for building or maintaining the fence unless a written agreement, recorded with the County Recorder, was entered into between the parties addressing responsibility for the fence. In assessing fairness, six factors are considered in determining each landowner's share of responsibility: (a) topography of the properties, (b) presence of waterways (c) presence of trees, (d) risk of trespassers, (e) importance of marking the division line and (d) presence of livestock.

Fifth, a formal determination of a landowner's equitable share can be accomplished by either landowner filing a line fence "complaint" with the Board of Township Trustees or the Court of Common Pleas where the fence is located. However, landowners can agree to establish their equitable shares themselves or continue to maintain the line fence as they did before the law changed in 2008. Next, as to new line fences—placing a line fence where one was not in existence—the responsibility for such a fence is solely on the landowner who wants or plans to use the fence. However, if an adjoining neighbor uses a new line fence, the party constructing it may have a right to seek reimbursement for the fence from the neighbor <u>if</u> he or she filed Affidavits establishing the costs of the fence. This is important because the right to seek reimbursement exists if the neighbor uses it anytime within 30 years of its construction.

In conclusion, this article is intended to provide broad, general information about the line fence law. It is not intended to be legal advice. Lake-Geauga Recovery Centers, Inc. (LGRC) is a private, non-profit agency providing continuous service to the community since 1971. The Center provides a wide range of prevention and treatment services for individuals whose lives have been affected by their own or another's use of drugs or alcohol, by problem gambling, or by mental illness.

Guided by our mission statement, "To promote lifelong recovery from addiction through education, prevention, and treatment, regardless of ability to pay", our goal for treatment services is to help our consumers achieve long-term recovery and an improved quality of life. Our prevention services strive to educate the community about issues related to alcohol, other drugs, problem gambling, and focus on the reduction of abuse through sound prevention strategies.

LGRC offers expert counseling and support to individuals, families, businesses, other service providers, and the community at large, at our outpatient offices in Mentor, Painesville and Chardon. Outpatient services include:

My struggles and reasons why my mom would benefit and thrive in a care community.

Transitioning my mom to a care community such as the Lantern can be hard and difficult. Unable to care for my mom or unable to be for her when she dearly need me the most makes me vulnerable and guilty. It is heart breaking! No one can love and care for my mom like the way I do. Exploring options to enable my mom to live at her home or at my home is definitely therapeutic and beneficial. However, a house cannot be a home unless it contains memories and experiences that my mom can relate to. How often do I as an adult child engage with her, if she lives with me or at her home? Transitioning my mom to a wonderful loving care community could be a gift I give my mom.

A home-care arrangement may not be ideal always, as my mom's home may not be designed for her safety. Environmental barriers such as rugs, floor mats and stairs could be hazardous. Bathrooms without safety designs such as grab bars and railings could place her at risk for increased falls. An environment that fosters human engagement, exercises and activities are crucial for my mom to thrive and live a life that is fulfilling to her. Early into the transition, it can be very hard for her and me. However, by extending time to adjust and acclimate can be an experience she and I may grow to embrace and cherish.

When will my mom be appropriate for a care community? In my mind, if she has one of the following-

- 1. Requires one on one care for greater than eight hours.
- 2. I'm unable to meet my mom's needs timely and appropriately.
- 3. My mom requires round the clock care.
- 4. My mom requires assistance to eat, brush her teeth, and comb her hair, dress, bathe and walk.
- 5. My mom is losing weight.
- 6. My mom is not drinking enough fluids and is dehydrated.
- 7. My mom is unable to live alone due to unknown fear.
- 8. My mom gets lost in her own neighborhood.
- 9. My mom is seeing and hearing things that I'm unable to relate to.
- 10. My mom is not taking her medications timely.
- 11. My mom is buying unwanted stuff and hoarding them.
- 12. My mom spends most of her time sitting in a couch watching TV with little to no activity.
- 13. My mom is unable to recall events from her immediate past.
- 14. My mom has incontinence issues.
- 15. I'm constantly concerned and worried about my mom's safety and wellbeing.
- 16. I'm emotionally drained and unable to emotionally care for my mom.
- 17. When mom wanders away from her home.

By having my mom in a care community doesn't make me a terrible or a bad son. In no way does it diminish my unconditional love for my mom. Choosing a wonderful care community for her is like her choosing a great school or a college for me. Sacrificing her own happiness, she loved and provided for me. Now it is my chance to give her what is fulfilling for her. Enabling her to live a life that is childlike filled with innocence and no worries of tomorrow.




